The current gaming operations of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes has been Eastern Idaho's gaming facility for finding fast action fun and high energy excitement for over 30 years, and has experience in three gaming properties:



The Shoshone-Bannock Casino Hotel has a variety of restaurants, a full service salon and spa. The Hotel & Event Center offers 156 rooms, over 15,000 square feet of event space, a pool, and a fitness center. Located off I-15 exit 80 North of Pocatello.



Sage Hill Travel Center and Casino features 100 gaming machines, the Bohogoi Café, Truckers Lounge, Showers, Convenience Store and Gas Station. Located off I-15 exit 89 South of Blackfoot, this is the perfect place to grab a bite, play and relax.



Bannock Peak Casino features just over 60 gaming machines. An ideal place to take a break from your travel. Located off Interstate 86 at exit 52 in Arbon Valley just West of Pocatello, Idaho, adjacent to the Bannock Peak Truck Stop.

About the Tribes

The Shoshone and Bannock peoples have inhabited the area now known as Idaho for over 12,000 years. The Tribes entered into 11 treaties with the United States relinquishing millions of acres of their original homelands. On July 3, 1868, Shoshone and Bannock Tribal leaders signed the Fort Bridger Treaty, which established the Fort Hall Reservation as the home of the Shoshone and Bannock people in southeastern Idaho.

The Tribes established a formal government in 1936 and are a federally recognized sovereign nation with the inherent right of self-governance, including the power to govern themselves, determine their own membership, and create economic development for the betterment of their people and community.

Why did the Tribes purchase the land in Elmore County near Mountain Home?

The 157 acres of land purchased by the Tribes is within the Tribes' vast ancestral territory known as the Great Camas Prairie. The United States negotiated the Treaty of Fort Boise, Treaty with the Bruneau Shoshone, and the Long Tom Creek Treaty recognizing the expansive territory of the Shoshone and Bannock bands, but never ratified them.

The Tribes purchased the land in 2020 for economic development projects in order to generate revenue to provide for basic human needs, employment, reducing poverty and increasing health and wellness conditions of its Tribal members.
